Our offerings include play areas, walking trails, cycling, kayaking, swimming, paddleball, beach cricket, and beach football, among others.

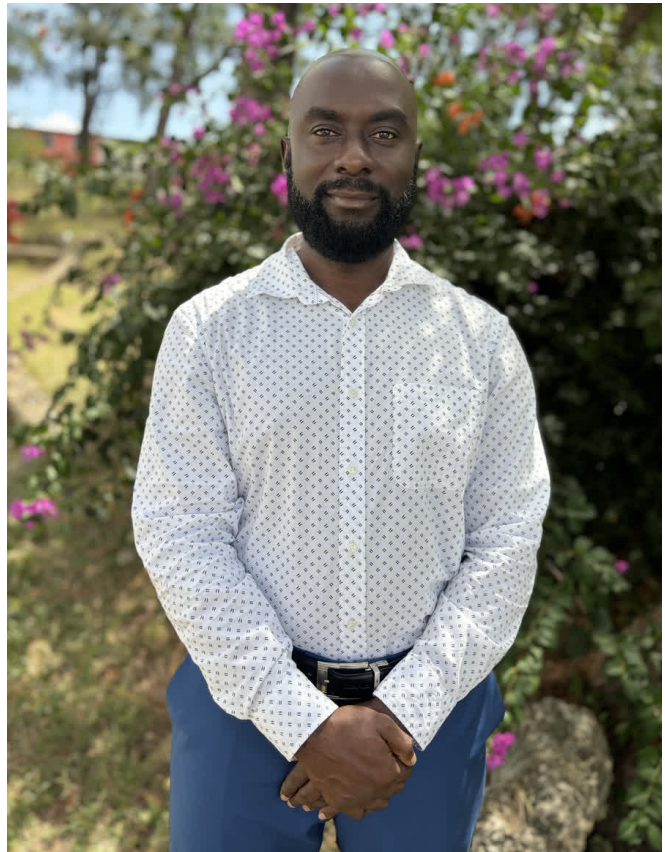

Renewable energy powers security station



The NCC's Codrington Headquarters security station has been completed.

NESTLED AMONG THE lush greenery at the entrance of the National Conservation Commission's (NCC) Codrington Headquarters is the new security station, which will be operated by personnel of the Ranger/Warden Service.

The off-white cottage style building, which is trimmed with dark brown boards and has a radiant royal blue base, accentuates the aesthetics of the historic central property.

With modern fixtures, such as solar powered lights, the NCC's team continues to introduce renewable energy components to its facilities. William Husbands, the NCC's Senior Electrician, was responsible for this aspect of the building's construction.

"The renewable energy component included the installation of emergency lighting and all of its security lights are solar powered," he disclosed.

The new security station was also wired more adequately in comparison to the previous station, according to Husbands. "As a result, it can accommodate additional electrical appliances such as a small fridge. We have also installed an air conditioner unit on the building to bring some much needed relief for the staff on humid days," he explained. The staff also have more space to execute their duties as the new building is double the size of the previous security station.

A counter with lockers has been installed as part of the station's design for the staff's personal belongings.

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Artisans lauded for their outstanding work

NCC's Acting General Manager, Ryan Als, lauded the staff of the Building and Works Department for their seamless execution of this project.

He also seized the opportunity to reiterate his satisfaction with the team's efforts during the refurbishment and restoration of Codrington House - the NCC's main building.

While he alluded to the complexity of the project, given its magnitude and intricacies, Als underscored the 40-member team's willingness and capacity to rise to the occasion and overcome obstacles.

He credited their strategic approaches to said obstacles for yielding the desired results on Codrington House.

The security station's team included Carpenter, Randolph Johnson, and Artisans, Junior Sealy and Patrick Hinds, who also worked on Codrington House. Johnson and Sealy worked assiduously

to construct the station, which was built on a concrete foundation.

The talented gentlemen utilized concrete board and lumber for the building's structure, which also has a panelled white interior.

Sealy meticulously cut and prepared the shingles for the roof, prior to their application.

With assistance from Johnson, the pair worked expeditiously to ensure they maintained the timeline of the project, despite minor delays caused by the intermittent inclement weather.

The Artisans also worked closely with the painters, who were strategic in their execution, given the unpredictability of the weather.

And despite the brief disruptions, the new security station was constructed, completed and presented to the Ranger/Warden service, within one month - the stipulated timeline.

Electrical back-up storage units for 10 sites



Folkestone museum and restaurant have been earmarked for the installation of electrical back-up storage units to the minimize disruption of their operations.

PLANNING AND PREPARATION are the fundamental factors propelling the National Conservation Commission's (NCC) thrust to maintain operational capability and reduce the adverse effects of natural disasters.

Emphasizing the need to be 'forward thinking', NCC's Acting General Manager, Ryan Als, indicated that power outages and fluctuating power supply have been a concern for the NCC in its daily operations and emergency situations.

"By hardening our [electrical] infrastructure, this will ensure that we are ready to face challenges and can rebound faster when natural disasters strike, especially with annual forecasts showing the increase likelihood of the

the development of more weather systems during the hurricane season," he explained.

Consequently, 10 of the NCC's facilities have been earmarked for the installation of electrical back-up storage units. They include the NCC's Garden Centre and Tissue Culture Lab, Farley Hill's restaurant and staff quarters, Folkestone's museum and restaurant, King George V Memorial Park's facility and the offices in Queen's Park.

William Husbands, NCC's Senior Electrician, said that the electrical back-up storage units will facilitate the commercial demands of the facilities when there is a

power outage.

With a maximum charging power of 8,800 watts, Husbands noted that the battery will be fully charged in about two hours and fully discharged over a period of 36 hours.

He added: “The unit acts very similar to the average back-up generator. However, its advantages over the regular generator is that it is obviously quieter, it occupies significantly less space than a generator with the same capacity.”

An added bonus is the unit’s in-door installation capability, which provides more security and facilitates close monitoring.

“The Unit's activity may also be monitored by smart devices with added features to its installation. It is portable and may be repositioned or relocated with the least manpower,” Husbands explained.

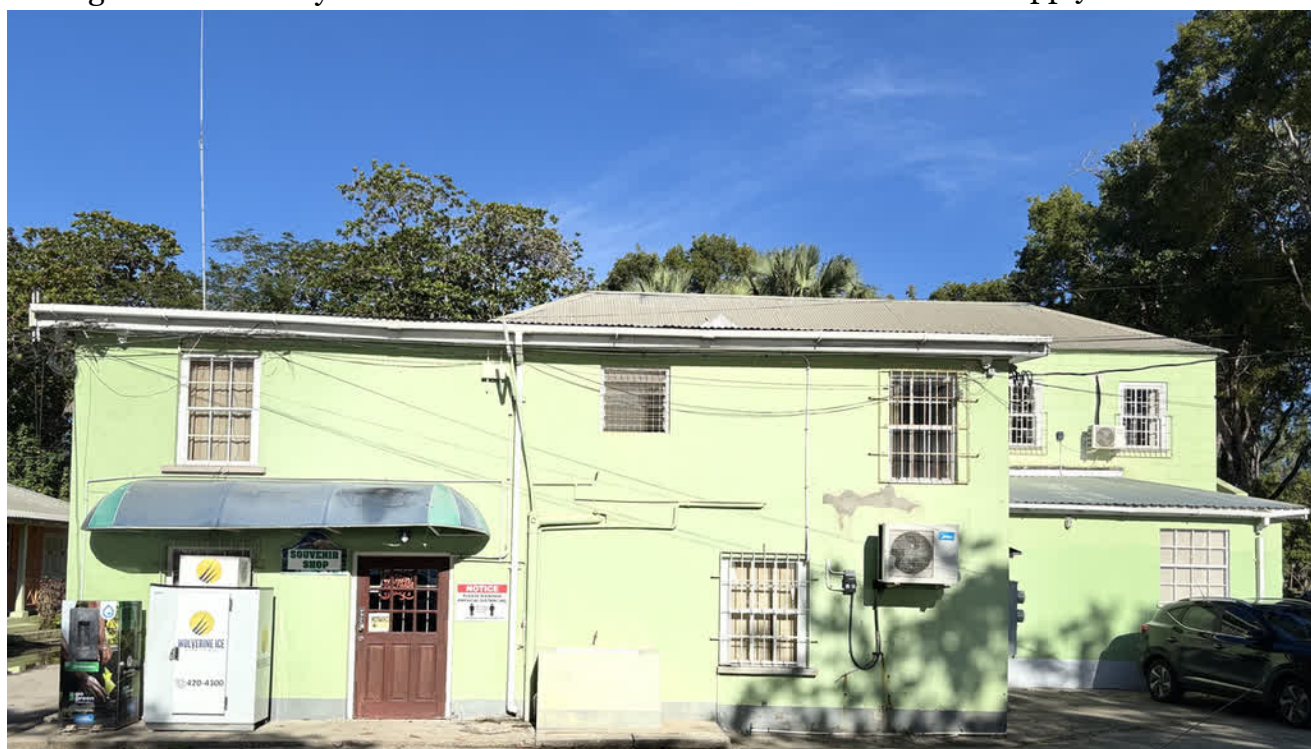
The power demand or increase, he added, may easily be regulated by simply adding another battery to the unit.

“These units definitely carry more options and add-on features than a regular back-up generator. In the case of electrical power outages at these selected NCC facilities, the units will restore power and allow for the standard operations to continue, hence the ongoing presence of our employees on the job, while continuing to provide a service to the public at a fully functional facility,” Husbands opined.

Meanwhile, Als disclosed that the project, which will be led by Husbands, will commence within the first half of next year, utilizing a phased approach.

He added that this approach is ideal for some of the facilities that are scheduled for refurbishment and restoration works, such as Folkestone museum and restaurant.

Project updates will be provided in upcoming editions of The Commission, as the team endeavours to bolster the NCC’s daily operations, with the support of efficient electrical supply.

Meet NCC's Tractor Operator, Hallan Greene

Utilising tools, such as the lawnmower and lawn edger, he beautified his assigned areas to perfection.

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Beautifying Barbados is blissful for Greene

“I enjoyed this role because I love beautifying play parks and I especially loved working down Trevor’s Way in The City. The tourists would often pass and admire the landscaping work and the gardens,” he recalled. Greene’s love and passion for beautifying Barbados intensified with each assignment.

“Beautifying the country was, and still is significant to me, especially when people saw the work I did before.

Their compliments made me feel good that I was doing it for my country,” he declared.

His love and passion for beautification did not go unrecognised by the NCC’s management team, as they expanded Greene’s portfolio to include tractor operations.

“This was a bit rough and difficult but became smooth and easy because I also matured with it. When I first started, I did not know a lot about the machinery, but as I became more familiar and knowledgeable, it became easier and maturity played a key role... Now, I really enjoy doing it,” he explained. One of Greene’s more outstanding assignments in this capacity entailed being a member of the team that developed the National Botanical Gardens.

“Although this work was technical, I enjoyed it. I gained a lot of knowledge and experience through this project from Dr. Nigel Jones. Mr. Ryan Als has

also complimented me on the work done. The Prime Minister, Mia Amor Mottley, shared her appreciation for my contribution and even nicknamed me ‘Tractor Man’. I felt warm about that,” he said with a smile.

Greene alluded to developing and utilising a strategy, given the technicality of the assignment.

He added: “I had to be mindful of the small trees in the space while I operated the equipment. My focus was primarily ensuring that I cut the grass at a height and level that was appropriate and it was aesthetically pleasing.”

Paying close attention to details has worked in Greene’s favour, particularly during the Flail Mower’s workshop that was organised by the NCC.

“A MTW [Ministry of Transport and Works] operator trained some of us at the NCC and this prepared me to operate the machinery. I primarily operate it now and I get a lot of praise for the work I do

and I am happier knowing I do such a wonderful job for the public. Sometimes there are ups and downs with persons traversing the roads while I am operating but it is mainly smooth sailing,” he disclosed. The appreciation Greene receives for his work from members of the public is unmatched.

“The compliments I receive let me know that people are acknowledging my work. They have even spoke about my work on the call-in programmes and this also makes me feel good. I always get praise for what I do and sometimes people even stop me while I am doing it to share their compliments and this always warms my heart,” he said with glee.

And while Greene is a team player, he equally enjoys working independently.

He succinctly said: “I produce more work, I am more comfortable at times and the results speak for themselves.” These results exceed his duties at the NCC as Greene’s beautification efforts have enhanced the aesthetics of open spaces in Chalky Mount - the quiet, rural village that he calls home.

“I do this during my spare time... this is like a hobby for me and it keeps me active and contributes to my wellness. My body feels good while I am doing it and I don’t have any pains associated with it. I don’t know about the future but I feel good now,” he expressed.

30 bollards installed at Fitts Village Beach

THE PROTECTION OF the endangered leatherback and hawksbill sea turtles is paramount to officials at the National Conservation Commission (NCC).

And their commitment was recently reaffirmed with the installation of 30 bollards on a section of the beach at Fitts Village, St. James - the open lot immediately north of the Church of Jesus the Good Shepherd. NCC's Acting General Manager, Ryan Als, said that the bollards 'are but one form of defence to save baby turtles'. "Thousands of sea turtles die every year at Fitts Village Beach. They are often crushed by vehicles, eaten by rats and mongooses, and lured to their demise by the bright lights," he disclosed. In recognition of the rodent and mongoose attacks on the sea turtles, Als indicated that the NCC's team will

be bolstering its efforts to reduce their presence at this beach.

Another area of high priority for the team is illegal dumping, which significantly impacts the environmental conditions of the western beach.

"We try to remove litter from the beach on a daily basis but we lack the necessary collection vehicles at this time to execute this task as desired. It is further compounded by persons who dump construction and household waste on the beach," Als stressed.

Notwithstanding the challenges, the NCC's team remains committed to conserving the sea turtle population in support of the Barbados Sea Turtle Project's efforts. Earlier this year, Carla Daniel, Director of the Barbados Sea Turtle Project, made an impassioned plea for assistance from the NCC to maintain and improve the conditions at this beach for the sea turtles.

Sea turtle conservation efforts are critical

The placement of bollards, the planting of low and mid-level vegetation to improve the screening of artificial light from the beach as well as the proper maintenance of the existing vegetation were outlined by Daniel, as areas that the NCC can play a critical role to save the sea turtles.

“This critically endangered species is now facing unprecedented threats from development of its nesting beaches. In 2023, for the third year in a row, numbers of nesting females declined. Without human intervention, it will take very little for our population to crash,” she stressed.

The planting of vegetation was previously explored by the NCC team however, their unauthorised removal by cutlass wielding persons have impacted the full implementation of

this measure.

While he referenced the development and implementation of a comprehensive beach management plan, Als emphasised the importance of the public supporting his team’s efforts to ensure that harmony exists between man and nature.

“Recreation and economic activity must work together with conservation to enable us to enjoy our natural environment and maintain our biodiversity and species protection,” he asserted.

In addition to the placement of bollards at Fitts Village beach, the NCC’s team has installed turtle friendly at several facilities including the Bath Beach Facility in St. John, Worthing Beach Facility in Christ Church and Pebbles Beach Facility in St. Michael.

To date, over 20 turtle friendly lights have been installed as part of the project.
